My name is ḥapinyuuk. I am Huu-ay-aht and I come from the House of čaačaacii?as. My English name is Tommy Happynook, and I am an assistant professor in the department of Anthropology at the University of Victoria. My research documents the reclamation of knowledge, teachings, culture, language, responsibilities, and identity through my relationship to čaačaacii\(\cap{a}\)s, my family's hereditary home. In specific and intentional ways my research is part of a larger story of reconciliation and reclamation to hahuuli in which the lands, waters, skies, and the natural/spiritual worlds are not a place and/or object of inquiry, they are non-human knowledge holders and teachers.
